1. Background

To effectively review progress on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), it is essential to consider their interlinkages. This is especially true for SDG5 (Gender Equality), which is under review at the High-Level Political Forum (HLPF) and influences many other SDGs. Women are essential to agrifood systems, yet equality between men and women remains unachieved. Moving forward on SDG5 is key to achieving SDG2 (Zero Hunger) and also highlights the importance of SDG4 (Quality Education) and SDG8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth) as key drivers of sustainable agrifood systems.

Young people worldwide have emphasized the need to prioritize these accelerators, as reflected in the Beijing+30 Declaration, where Quality Education and Training (Priority Area No. 2) and Economic Justice and Rights (Priority Area No. 6) emerged as key focus areas. These priorities highlight the critical role of education, skills development and economic opportunities in empowering young women in agrifood systems, reinforcing the connection between SDGs 4, 5 and 8.

The World Food Forum (WFF) Global Youth Action Initiative (Youth Initiative), a youth-led global network of partners hosted by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), is dedicated to

advancing all SDGs through integrated, youth-driven agrifood systems transformation. Building on this commitment, the WFF Youth Initiative actively mobilizes young people and their allies to drive holistic, strategic and scalable change in agrifood systems.

With the in-depth review of SDG5, the Beijing+30 Declaration and the International Year of the Woman Farmer in 2026, the 2025-2026 biennium presents a pivotal opportunity to advance gender equality in agrifood systems. In this context, the WFF Youth Assembly, in collaboration with the UN Major Group for Children and Youth (MGCY), will lead a year-long consultation in 2025 to gather youth perspectives on SDG5 within agrifood systems. This process will culminate in a 'Youth Recommendations Paper,' to be presented at HLPF 2025, outlining key calls to action for accelerating progress at the intersection of SDGs 4, 5, and 8, with SDG2 serving as the operational framework.

This consultation process will serve as an important youth positioning moment in the build-up to the International Year of the Woman Farmer in 2026, which seeks to highlight the crucial role that women, and in particular, young women, play in agrifood systems, with their contributions to food security, nutrition and poverty eradication. Within this process, this ECOSOC Youth Forum side event will provide a platform for intergenerational learning, best practice sharing, and the development of youth recommendations aimed at recognizing and empowering young women in sustainable agrifood systems. These recommendations will play a vital role in mobilizing local action for transforming our agrifood systems, leaving no one behind.

2. Objectives of the side event, including relation with the SDGs identified in the Guidelines

- Continue the year-long process of knowledge exchange, consultations and collaboration among youth, experts and policymakers to analyze SDG5 in relation to other SDGs and development challenges.
- Highlight interconnections between the SDGs, fostering a youth-led discussion focusing on the relevance of SDG4 and 8 for young women in agrifood systems.
- Bring together diverse organizations and technical experts to address the most pressing issues concerning youth, especially young women, education and employment.
- Provide opportunities for youth eager to actively participate in transforming agrifood systems to connect with technical experts to gain insights on issues related to women, decent rural employment, education and training within agrifood systems, and receive support in shaping youth priorities on these various topics.
- Collection of inputs on the interlinkages between SDGs 2, 4, 5 and 8 to inform the development of a youth recommendations paper for presentation at the HLPF 2025.
